## **RTS 28 Quality of Execution Annual Report**

**Firm:** Brigade Capital UK LLP (the "**Firm**")

Other orders, including those relating to international equities, that cannot be executed automatically will be dealt manually with another regulated firm or via a Multilateral Trading Facility (MTF). This involves a manual search for reference trading prices via market data feeds or by comparing prices offered by other market participants. When an appropriate counterparty is identified, the price is negotiated manually and executed on the best terms identified for the order in question. This may occur off-exchange.
